Welcome

Mōrena e te whānau. Good morning church family. My name is Mike, and it is my pleasure to welcome you to worship here at Kaurihohore Church this morning on the first Sunday after Pentecost, also known as Trinity Sunday.

To quote Diana Butler Bass: It is often said that more heresy is preached on this particular day than any other day of the Christian year! Far too many naive sermonizers have sought to explain the mystery of the Trinity to their congregations and ended up with a theological mess on their hands.

Now I sympathise with people trying to come up with metaphors to explain the mystery of the Trinity. There's a hilarious satire clip online where two Irish peasants are trying to understand the Trinity through a discussion with St Patrick that descends into chaos as St Patrick comes up with heretical metaphor after heretical metaphor. I won't play it now but if you're interested can do so after the service.

When it comes to the Trinity, we need to grapple with the mystery and if that means we lapse into heresy from time to time as we try and get our head around it, so be it (and who hasn't!).

Today I'm not going to be delving into the mystery of the Trinity, instead I want to focus on the names we give the members of the Trinity – traditionally God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit.

This service will be a little bit different in that I'm not going to have a formal reflection, instead I'll be asking us to think about the names of the Trinity used in scripture, poetry and song. So, through the service, I invite you to listen to the names that are being used for the members of the Trinity, and ponder which names resonate for you, and what other names you might create...

Call to worship

Scripture readings: Proverbs 8:1-4, 22-31

John 16:12-15

- Womb of life, and source of being, home of ev'ry restless heart, in your arms the worlds awakened; you have loved us from the start. We, your children, gather 'round you, at the table you prepare. Sharing stories, tears and laughter, we are nurtured by your care.
- Word in flesh, our brother Jesus, born to bring us second birth, you have come to stand beside us, knowing weakness, knowing earth. Priest who shares our human struggles, Life of Life, and Death of Death, risen Christ, come stand among us, send the Spirit by your breath.

 When our mem'ry fails, remind us whose we are, what we intend.
 Labour with us, aid the birthing of the new world yet to be, free of servant, lord, and master free for love and unity.
- 4. Mother, Brother, holy Partner; Father, Spirit, Only Son: we would praise your name forever, one-in-three, and three-in-one. We would share your life, your passion, share your word of world made new, ever singing, ever praising, one with all, and one with you.

Reflection

I'm going to share an excerpt from a Trinity Sunday sermon by one of my favourite theologians, Wil Gafney:

We celebrate the relationship between Jesus and his God and Father who sent him into this world, to us, today on Trinity Sunday. Jesus speaks of God as his Father, of himself as the Son of Woman – I know your translations say "Son of Man" but the Greek can mean either... And Jesus speaks of the Spirit who gives birth to us. Throughout the gospels Jesus speaks of God by many names, inviting us to do the same: Wisdom who is justified by her deeds and her children, the male farmer who plants the mustard seed, the baker-woman who kneads yeast into her loaf, the male shepherd who leaves the ninety-nine sheep to find the one lost sheep; the woman house-holder who sweeps her house looking for her precious lost coin; the Advocate and the Comforter and many, many more.

Isaiah named God as "Lord," and LORD or Commander of Heaven's armies, and then as the One Who Rules, Commander of Heaven's armies. First Isaiah calls God "lord" with lower case letters; something like "honoured sir," a human title shared by Moses and other important men. Then Isaiah calls God something like "LORD" with capital letters, representing God's Most Holy Name that cannot

be pronounced by human tongues and is related to the verb "I AM;" LORD or Commander of Heaven's armies or "hosts." ...

The church has largely settled on one way of naming God to our great poverty. The blessed, holy Trinity is one way and only one way of naming the God of many names, the God of Isaiah, the God of Jesus and our God...

God is beyond numbering and naming. The scriptures use many more than three names or images to describe God and do not limit us to any. And the scriptures do not mention the Trinity at all. Three names make a nice poetic flourish. But God is not bound or limited by our limitations. God is One, and Two – Incarnate and Incorporeal, and Three and Seven (the "seven spirits of God" in Revelation) and God is Many and Ineffable.

But since today is Trinity Sunday, Let's name God in Threes:

So I now invite you to spend some time coming up with names for the members of the Trinity that resonate with you, whether it's names we've used already today, other names you're aware of, or new names that you create – feel free to do it individually or in small groups with people around you – while you're doing so I'll have some of the artwork on the screen along with some of the names we've used so far in the service (plus a few additional names that Wil Gafney uses). There's space to write them down in the service sheet if you want.

Hold on to those names as we'll be using them in the commissioning at the end of the service.

What names resonate with you for the members of the Trinity?

I'm going to finish this part of the service with the final part of Wil Gafney's sermon:

However you name God, the Many-Named God transcends and defies our attempts to number and name. Instead, God conspires. To conspire is *con spiro*, to breathe together, not just deceitful or treacherous planning. God breathes with us, breathes in us, breathes through us in this Pentecost season to change the world through the Church.

We... have been sent. We have been commissioned to tell the story of the God who loves us, who is Love and bids us love one another, world without end. Amen.
