Message: "To Get to the Other Side"

Over the last three Sundays, Mark's gospel talked about:

Mk 3;2 The Pharisees accusing Jesus and his followers breaking the sabbath. rules.

Vs. 20-30, Teacher of the law said, "He is possessed by the demons. Then Jesus talks about a divided kingdom.

4:1-20 Parable of the Sower, vs 21-25 A lamp on a stand, vs 26-34 Parable of the growing seeds and the Parable of the mustard seed. Vs 35-41, Jesus calms the Storm.

In this morning's scripture we read about Jesus 'walking on the water'. We can find the same story in the gospels of Mathew and John. However, the account of Peter walking on the water is found only in Matthew.

If we are going to talk about Jesus and Peter actually walking on water as a Miracle, it must have happened once in history, then, what relevance is there for us today? In our own context? Normally miracles and/or supernatural things are far beyond human understanding, and against the nature which God created and the law of gravity. I think in that sense we are missing the point. There is an important lesson that Jesus wants us to learn. Therefore, I have chosen my topic as "*To get to the other side*".

1. Why did the disciples (attempt to) cross the lake?

To get to the other side. What's on the other side of the lake? What's so important on the other side?

- What Jesus, literally means, "immediately" (eutheos) "forces" (anagkazo in 14:22, "made" in NRSV -- both words come from Mark 6:45) is for the disciples to get into the boat and head in the direction of Bethsaida, which is on the Gentile side of the Jordan, but they don't make it.
- They end up in Gennesaret (Mk 6:53; Mt 14:34) which is on the Jewish side of Lake Galilee.

In Mark, the lake-crossing episodes illustrate the great problems in the early (Jewish) church of **including the Gentiles into the church**. Crossing the sea from **Jewish to Gentile** territories, there are storms (Mk 4:35-41; 6:45-52). Most of this is also present in Matthew's accounts (8:23-27; 14:22-33).

2. Can storms at sea (and "little faith") keep the disciples from reaching the destinations where Jesus wants them to go?

<u>To get to the other side</u>; What does it mean? Who are on the other side? What is so important? It was not about the disciples - it was about the early Church, the issue of admission of Gentiles into the earliest Jewish Christian community.

 At some level in most societies there is a tendency to seek domination as a form of self-protection, (because of fear of inclusiveness, fear of insecurity, fear of sharing resources, jobs, health, education).. etc.

The sad thing is some of those fears end up in self-destruction, tribal and ethnic wars, religious wars and killing, in order to eliminate the others, that's what is happening in Palestine right now and many other nations at war....I will leave it there.

• The people on "the other side; who are we really talking about?" And Jesus "forces" or "compels" us to go to.

They may be the unchurched, or minorities, the homeless, migrants, refugees or people with HIV/AIDS, or the physically and mentally challenged, or people whose first language is not English, or loud, noisy, or hard-of-hearing, the elderly, or LGBTQ community, etc.

They are people who are not quite like "us". They are people whom we or the Church might consider sinners or unclean, 'Apartheid' separating, setting apart. Apartheid is a policy that is separating people based on racial, ethnic and colour criteria. Have you heard some of the western leaders say, Palatines are like animals, therefore kill them, because Israelis were the chosen people. If we want to justify these concepts, yes, you can find enough biblical quotations taken out of context to support the evil, self-righteous concept of hierocracy to support apartheid, killing, slavery, treatment of women as second class, as we all know the Bible has been read as a judgemental text towards gays....and people who are living with HIV/AIDS. The question comes to my mind, are we trying to defend justice? or whom we like?

But Jesus "forces" or "compels" us to go to the other side...

- 3. What keeps us (Church) from doing what is JUSTICE or what Jesus wants us to do?
- There is a sea Monster operating in <u>our world</u>, in <u>our mind</u> and in <u>the Church</u>, not allowing us to do what Jesus wants us to do in the world.

<u>The monster of racism.</u> It creates hate, in the name of insecurity and fear. The monster of violent culture and the education we were brought up with, wrong ethics and theology.

- How do we overcome the power of this Monster operating in our world that creates chaos. ("walking on" = conquest; "sea" = anti-creation chaos monster).
- In biblical language only God walks on the sea (Job 9:8; 38:16; Ps 77:19; Isa 43:16; 51:9-10; Hab 3:5). Precisely in the midst of these stories, Jesus does what only God can do, and speaks with the voice of God, "I am."

Can storms at sea (and "little faith") keep us from reaching the destinations where Jesus wants us to go?
