# Reflection

Head south from Tuscon, Arizona, and you could find yourself in the Sonoron Desert. The desert straddles the Mexico-United States border and has become a migration corridor for asylum-seekers escaping poverty and violence in their homeland. These people are desperate, and they are faced with a lethally, harsh environment on this last part of their journey. The landscape is arid, and summertime temperatures reach over 40 degrees Celsius. Migrants, often travelling in family groups, mainly moving at night to escape the heat. But the ever-present threat of exhaustion and dehydration results in an ever-growing number of deaths in these borderlands between Mexico and the United States. When their supplies have run out, one can only imagine the despairing longing for water in the scorching heat.

According to a news report, a humanitarian organisation called No more Deaths, works to make the Mexico-United States border a little less deadly by leaving containers of water in the places where people are thirsty and dying of dehydration. Their report details how the United States Border control has cracked down on migrant justice initiatives in general and no More Deaths in particular, arresting volunteers on criminal charges ranging from misdemeanour to felony. However, a case that actually came to court was dismissed by the judge on the basis that the actions were motivated by 'sincerely held religious beliefs', and government prosecution would amount to a violation of religious liberty!

Water can be a matter of life and death. In today's Psalm, David uses this metaphor to speak of his longing for God: 'you are my God. I seek you. My soul thirsts for you, as in a dry and weary land where there is no water.' I long for a stream in a scorching desert.

It is true that when we are not in touch with our God, we become parched, like being confined to a waterless wilderness. While some may grow accustomed to living in this waterless place – arid of meaning and purpose – this Psalm represents a longing for more. It speaks of the restless dissatisfaction that comes of not knowing God's presence. It is what Saint Augustine writes about in his Confessions, when he states 'You have made us for Yourself O God and our hearts are restless in you.' For David, the restlessness is satisfied. He finds God in both the desert and the sanctuary. He gets to drink from the stream in the desert and sees God's glory and power in the place of worship. He discovers God's love, and it means more to him than life itself.

The Hebrew word translated to English 'love' is 'hesed'. This is a rich word which is hard to translate with a single English equivalent. It is one of the central concepts of the First Testament and often comes up in our readings. It is sometimes translated with double-banger words to bring out its fuller meaning: 'loving kindness' and 'steadfast love.' It is full of tones of compassion and faithfulness. It speaks of the committed loyalty that God has toward us, his people.

In the desert and in the sanctuary, Lent is the time for us to intentionally seek God; to know more of God's power and glory and to live in the richness of his love. David calls it a shield and shelter that we live under. It is the source of our security and joy.

It is a time to take a solitary walk outdoors using the opportunity to talk to God about our thoughts and ambitions, and listen to his still small voice of guidance.

It is a time to take a lead from David who says to the Lord, 'I think about You on my bed, and meditate on You in the watches of the night.'

When our hearts long for God, as one would long for a stream in a desert, we grow in trust and awareness of the Divine presence to help. To find this security and love means more than life itself!

The Psalm is an invitation for us in this season of Lent to seek afresh the presence of God. It belongs together with our reading this morning from Isaiah. 'If you are thirsty, come and drink water! Seek the Lord while he may be found, call upon him while he is near; let the wicked forsake their way, and the unrighteous their thoughts; let them return to the Lord, that he may have mercy on them, and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon.'

'Turn to the Lord! He can still be found. Call out to God! He is near.'
