First reading: Micah 4:1-5

Second reading: Luke 9:49-55

Message: Inclusiveness and peaceful co-existence

(Please read the background bible references before reading the sermon: 2 Samuel 5; 1-4 (Warrior king). John 1:11, Mark 6:1-5(Prince of Peace) and the Son of God. 1 Samuel 15;1-4).

Gen chapter 1 and 2 was the answer to a different question of the people: 'What is God's intention for the world- how and the purpose it was created?'. Life is to be lived in relationship with God, with people, with all living creatures, and with the plant earth. Everything is inter-dependent. It seems creation as a gift. Our Life is a gift from God, what we do with that gift is our gift to God.

It speaks the wholeness rather than divisions, relationship and accountability rather than exploitation.

Look at the picture, Prophet Micah is creating in chapter 4. Was the world ever like this? But, if that picture of a harmonious relationship was what God intended for the world, quite clearly that was not what had eventuated. What we have today divided world, nations at war with nations, religious wars, tribal wars, economic war, fighting for power, possessions for themselves. Millions of people left out in poverty and in refugee camps etc,...On the other hand gross destruction of our forest and animals, fisheries and birds, as well as the pollution of sea and rivers, the air and the ozone layer and the use of space for weapons mass destruction, nuclear and hypotonic weapons. These are the consequences of structural sin and the sin of the rich/ fanatics/fundamentalism and the people who thinks that they have the whole **truth**, our **way** is the only way.

 Vs. 49, Master we saw a person driving out demons in your name, we stopped him. Because <u>he/she doesn't belong to our group</u>.

<u>Auckland</u> is one of the world's most culturally diverse cities with the fourth most foreign-born population. According to an international study it has been found. that 42 per cent of its population born overseas, the city is revealed to be more diverse than Sydney, Los Angeles, London and even New York. Only Dubai, Brussels, where foreign born residents outnumber local born, and Toronto are ranked as cities with more overseas-born people than Auckland.

<u>Culture and Identity:</u> (There is always something for immigrants to learn too). Culture is way of life and Identity

<u>Diversity</u> - Two ways of understanding "diversity".

- 1. <u>If you take diversity as a **challenge**</u>, then you have to keep 'dominion' as a form of self-protection because fear of inclusiveness (fear of sharing resource, jobs, education etc) then you will have to stand up for it. Some even taken the responsivity to eliminate, genocide/apathy. E.g. Palestine, Rohigia in Myanmar.
- 2. <u>If you take **diversity** as a rich component</u> of our multicultural society and the inclusive churches, then it will be a blessing.

There are many ways to understand God, but God has His own way to come into our hearts, No one or no church has a monopoly over the truth of God.

• John Wesley once said, "I have no right," to object to a person for holding <u>a</u> different opinion from mine.

When his nephew, Samuel, (son of his brother Charles), when he couldn't find a Methodist Church to worship, then, went to a Roman Catholic church, John wrote to him, I don't care what church you go to as long as you believe in Jesus Christ...

'Be true to your principles,use every ordinance which you believe is of God. Beware of narrowness of spirit,love as brothers and sisters those who cannot agree with you,agree with truth and reason. Condemn no one for not thinking as you think. Let everyone enjoy the full liberty of thought, abhor every approach, in any kind or degree, to the spirit of persecution. If you cannot reason or persuade a person into the truth, never attempt to force someone into it.'

Lk 9: 51-56, Since hospitality for Jesus was refused by the Samaritans, the disciples wanted to take revenge, and wanted to destroy the villages. Like Samuel 15. **Peace or violence -** Most of the people and communities, countries, families think they are righteous and they honor peace as long as other parties respect them..... The concept is "if you want peace we have it, if you want violence we can deliver it", **Peace or violence -** If they accept us, that's fine, otherwise destroy them all. Please read 1 Samuel 15. This is a MOB mentality.

Why should anybody become an enemy just because he or she belongs to a different religion, ethnic group holding on to a different ideology? Let us look what Prophet Micah is saying and what is his dream. And what does it mean by Peaceful Coexistence Micah 4:1-5. Let us do a re-reading of this pasage.

- God will settle disputes among the nations
- (Values of the Kingdom) People will turn killing machines or weapons into agricultural tools. Turn the minds of scientists to development rather than building nuclear weapons.
- No preparation for war...
- Every one live in peace....Peace is having his/her own income.
- Each nation will have their own religion and god, but we will worship our God.

Amen, Peace to the world, may God continue to bless us all.
