Readings

Acts 9:1-20 New Revised Standard Version, Anglicised

The Conversion of Saul

9 Meanwhile Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest ² and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. ³ Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. ⁴ He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, 'Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?' ⁵ He asked, 'Who are you, Lord?' The reply came, 'I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. ⁶ But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do.'

⁷The men who were travelling with him stood speechless because they heard the voice but saw no one. ⁸ Saul got up from the ground, and though his eyes were open, he could see nothing; so they led him by the hand and brought him into Damascus. ⁹ For three days he was without sight, and neither ate nor drank.

¹⁰ Now there was a disciple in Damascus named Ananias. The Lord said to him in a vision, 'Ananias.' He answered, 'Here I am, Lord.' ¹¹ The Lord said to him, 'Get up and go to the street called Straight, and at the house of Judas look for a man of Tarsus named Saul. At this moment he is praying, ¹² and he has seen in a vision a man named Ananias come in and lay his hands on him so that he might regain his sight.'

¹³ But Ananias answered, 'Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much evil he has done to your saints in Jerusalem; ¹⁴ and here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who invoke your name.' ¹⁵ But the Lord said to him, 'Go, for he is an instrument whom I have chosen to bring my name before Gentiles and kings and before the people of Israel; ¹⁶ I myself will show him how much he must suffer for the sake of my name.' ¹⁷ So Ananias went and entered the house. He laid his hands on Saul and said, 'Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus, who appeared to you on your way here, has sent me so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit.'

¹⁸ And immediately something like scales fell from his eyes, and his sight was restored. Then he got up and was baptized, ¹⁹ and after taking some food, he regained his strength.

Saul Preaches in Damascus

For several days he was with the disciples in Damascus, ²⁰ and immediately he began to proclaim Jesus in the synagogues, saying, 'He is the Son of God.'

Jesus Appears to Seven Disciples

21 After these things Jesus showed himself again to the disciples by the Sea of Tiberias; and he showed himself in this way. ² Gathered there together were Simon Peter, Thomas called the Twin, Nathanael of Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee, and two others of his disciples. ³ Simon Peter said to them, 'I am going fishing.' They said to him, 'We will go with you.' They went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing.

⁴ Just after daybreak, Jesus stood on the beach; but the disciples did not know that it was Jesus. ⁵ Jesus said to them, 'Children, you have no fish, have you?' They answered him, 'No.' ⁶ He said to them, 'Cast the net to the right side of the boat, and you will find some.' So, they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in because there were so many fish. ⁷ That disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, 'It is the Lord!' When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he put on some clothes, for he was naked, and jumped into the lake. ⁸ But the other disciples came in the boat, dragging the net full of fish, for they were not far from the land, only about a hundred yards off.

⁹ When they had gone ashore, they saw a charcoal fire there, with fish on it, and bread. ¹⁰ Jesus said to them, 'Bring some of the fish that you have just caught.'

¹¹ So Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore, full of large fish, a hundred and fifty-three of them; and though there were so many, the net was not torn. ¹² Jesus said to them, 'Come and have breakfast.' Now none of the disciples dared to ask him, 'Who are you?' because they knew it was the Lord. ¹³ Jesus came and took the bread and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish. ¹⁴ This was now the third time that Jesus appeared to the disciples after he was raised from the dead.

Jesus and Peter

John, do you love me more than these?' He said to him, 'Yes, Lord; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my lambs.' ¹⁶ A second time he said to him, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' He said to him, 'Yes, Lord; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Tend my sheep.' ¹⁷ He said to him the third time, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' Peter felt hurt because he said to him the third time, 'Do you love me?' And he said to him, 'Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my sheep.

¹⁸ Very truly, I tell you, when you were younger, you used to fasten your own belt and to go wherever you wished. But when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will fasten a belt around you and take you where you do not wish to go.' ¹⁹ (He said this to indicate the kind of death by which he would glorify God.) After this he said to him, 'Follow me.'

Reading of "Song - My Love Came Through the City" Written by James K. Baxter Read by Jeanette Osborne

Sermon / Reflection - "What does it mean to, 'Follow Jesus'?"

May the words of my mouth and the meditations of our hearts be acceptable in your sight O Lord our strength and our redeemer. Amen.

I am not sure if I am brave or foolish to have selected these two texts from the lectionary readings to preach on this morning.

Unfortunately, we do not have time to really explore either text in depth, let alone to investigate how they each illustrate the understanding of what it meant to the early church to follow Jesus. I have instead chosen to focus on what we might hear in these texts about discerning how we are being called to follow Jesus in Te Kamo and Kaurihohore in the twenty-first century.

The story of Saul's conversion on the road to Damascus is so famous that the phrase, "Damascus Road experience" has become a common metaphor in everyday secular society for a life-changing experience. This story is told three times in slightly different ways in the book of Acts written by Luke (Acts 9, 22, 26) and Paul himself mentions it in his letter to the Galatians (1:13-17).

In Galatians Paul, referring to this experience, says," when God, was pleased to reveal his Son to me ..." The descriptions in Acts all talk of Saul having an experience in which Jesus appeared to him as a living reality in the present, although Saul does not immediately recognise who he is. Both Acts and Paul's letters agree that Saul, was radically transformed by the experience. Hence his being called not Saul but Paul from then on, reflecting that he had a new character. This transformation is symbolised in the story by Saul being made blind, then after three days, on being blessed by Ananias, "immediately something like scales fell from his eyes, and his sight was restored. Then he got up and was baptised"

The story in the Gospel of John about Peter and his mates going fishing, immediately resonates with many of us whose experience of fishing is similarly remembered for catching nothing.

But notice that again in this story the figure on the lakeside is not immediately recognised, "Jesus stood on the beach; but the disciples did not know that it was Jesus". This time the message from the lakeside figure is to do something unconventional, "'Cast the net to the right side of the boat". I understand the boats were designed for the net to be cast on the left side not the right side. The resulting catch led to them recognising the figure on the lakeside as Jesus. We then get the characteristic story elements of feeding, challenge and call to follow. In this case Peter is challenged three times, "Do you love me?" One for each time he had denied he knew Jesus in the crucifixion story. With the challenge each time, "Feed my lambs." "Tend my sheep." "Feed my sheep." With the story ending with the injunction, "Follow me."

The Easter message of Resurrection has been interpreted by some to mean that Jesus' physical corpse came to life again and walked out of his grave. An interpretation sometimes called "Physical Resuscitation". While this understanding would fit with some aspects of the stories it is hard to reconcile with the consistent difficulty people had in recognising the resurrected Jesus and in some aspects of the stories symbolism. It is also hard to make sense of Paul's Damascus Road experience as fitting with this understanding of Resurrection.

The other common interpretation is based on that given by Paul, that what died was Jesus physical body and what was raised was his spiritual body, which is also consistent with some aspects of the stories but not all.

The church does not require us to commit to either interpretation. It is a matter for individual study and conviction.

My reasons for mentioning it today is that I suspect that many in this community avoid church because they expect that we will pressure them to commit to saying they believe something they would find intellectually dishonest. They have heard different stories of what Christians believe which they either don't see any sense in or are so contentious they would rather stay away. These thoughts are relevant as we come to News and Views and share with each our ideas for the future of this Church.

Meanwhile, I would like to focus on what I think better reflects what I understand Jesus to have been talking about when he called Peter to, "Follow Me." Marcus Borg puts it this way, "Jesus and early Christianity were primarily focused on the transformation of lives and the world this side of death. Of course, Jesus and Paul and the other early Christians believed in an afterlife – that death was not the end. But that was not the heart of their message. Rather, it was about the kingdom of God on earth and what the world would be like under the lordship of God rather than the lords of this world."

Life in this transformed world was referred to as, "life in the age to come" which is often translated as eternal life or life everlasting. This translation again, I think, leads many to misunderstand what we are on about.

There are reasons to not commit to following Jesus.

If your God is personal wealth or fame; if you want to dominate, exploit and control others; if having power over others is more important to you than sharing in a community where each person is respected for who they are not what they own, then following Jesus is not your priority and you do not belong in a Christian church.

If being liked by thousands or millions on Facebook and charging high rates as an influencer are your goals in life, then belonging in a faith community, where caring about the poor and disadvantaged is a core mission focus, is not a good fit for you.

But if these are not your priorities, then I would like this faith community to be one where you feel welcomed and invited to explore what following Jesus would really mean for you and whoever you choose to invite.

We especially pray this morning for those who are ill and lonely,

Where we can show your love, move us.

Where what is needed is beyond what we can do, target our prayers so that: where there is violence, peace will prevail,

where there is hatred, forgiveness and reconciliation will replace it,

where there is selfishness and greed, there will be transformation and new life, where there is sickness or ill health, health and wholeness will be restored.

These prayers we bring in the spirit of your Son, our Lord Jesus. Amen.
