Prayer

Silence

May we find the light we need for the living of this day, this week, and this year.

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Lord's Prayer

Scripture reading: Jeremiah 31:7-14

In our reading from Jeremiah we hear that this is a promise of renewal from a place of hopelessness, captivity, despair ... Jeremiahs words are affirming that the present reality is not all there is. It's worth pointing out that when the exiles did finally return, there was a lot of work that needed to be done rebuilding, repairing, restoring: and the promise of bounty came at the cost of a lot of sweat! The Church down the ages has seen this as being fulfilled in Jesus: again, we need to remember that when Jesus preached about the proximity of God's Kingdom, there were still poor, there were still shortages of food, there were still people oppressed and needing healing and delivery. What changed was not the external circumstances, but peoples heart-attitudes: the kingdom of God burning within people's hearts provoked (and provokes) people to make changes ... the Kingdom of God still needs effort, work, energy ... this bounty is not cheap.

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Word of the day

Sometimes, at this time of the year, in this part of the world, it feels like everyone else has gone away, and only the 'remaining few' are still around. Of course, we know that by the end of the month, everyone will have gathered back in time to pick up every- day life.

The author of Jeremiah, however, is speaking to a people who have been spread far and wide by the Babylonian conquest. People have been removed from their land, family members are missing or perhaps killed, and social systems have been destroyed. And when everyone is drawn back to Judah, there are deep divisions between groups and vastly different understandings of what the future community should look like.

Jeremiah tells that when the rescue comes, there will be dancing and laughter and shouts of joy.

When and why do we want to dance and laugh and shout for joy in this place? What hinders us?

Scripture reading: Ephesians 1:3-14

One older New Testament commentator — John Stott — subtitles his commentary the letter to the Ephesians 'God's New Society'. Rereading this passage through that lens gives new perspectives ... is this what god wants from my community? From me? If this is ideal, what is the reality and why? It can be an interesting exercise to filter Parish council decisions through that matrix: is this decision or prioritising evolving our community towards a new society, or are we safeguarding a heritage, keeping safe?

The opening passage is about intentional equipping: about God's somehow choosing to use us for his purposes, about a plan that is being unfolded in us and with us. A huge part of this is the Holy Spirit The Greek word for Spirit, pneuma, can also be translated breath/wind/lifeforce ... re-reading this passage to say that God's holy breath inspires! Or God's holy wind empowers gives added nuances to an already beautiful passage.

Scripture reading: John 1:10-18

If Ephesians is a guitar strummed around a campfire, John's opening passages are a pipe organ: huge swelling chords reminding us of things like size, capacity, volume, decibels, majesty, the indescribable. The theology behind this passage fills countless tomes ... and many of John's hearers would doubtless be familiar with what he is implying. For many others, however, it would perhaps be heard as a glorious enthronement of Jesus in the purposes of God: and sometimes it needs to be heard as sheer glory, not as a puzzle to be completed.

These are all poignant themes for us as we start 2025 in a new way for our parish: as we seek to discern God's will for us here in Kauri, in this church and in this community.

Let us sing and dance for joy as we seek to spread this love of God.

We stand poised, waiting, balanced between the years.

What is behind is behind. We commit all now into your care: regrets, disappointments, brokenness, discouragement, damaged relationships, hard words, things done by us and to us. We leave them all behind. What is ahead concerns us now, what had happened behind can affect how we walk into this new year.

We choose in this moment to carry only that which will help us into the new year.

We choose, in this moment to carry those lessons, those skills, those understandings, that will lead us toward light, towards wholeness, towards integration and love.
