Reflection

So, do you think these disciples whom Jesus had just instructed what to do were overjoyed and excited about being sent out to share the good news of Jesus? Probably not! I assume that they might have felt like how we feel when the opportunity arises to share our faith with friends and neighbours. We get nervous. We are scared they will reject us as religious loonies! We tend to over plan and over think things. We plan a nice lunch for a struggling friend or have a little prepared speech to share with a family member in crisis. We just try too hard! In today's scripture Jesus tells his disciples – and is essentially telling us – 'Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals.' We need to let go of the excess, the plan, the prepared speech and just let it flow. Is it scary and nerve wracking? Yes!

Does it make us uncomfortable? Yes! Were the disciples comfortable being sent to towns where no one knew them? Absolutely not! The message of Jesus is not meant to make us comfortable and most definitely will and should take us out of our comfort zone. Just look at the beatitudes: 'Blessed are the poor for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted. Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the world.' God's way of doing things is completely backwards from society's way of acting.

So don't be discouraged if friends reject God's message, or our invitation to church, or the offer to pray for them

Do what you can and rejoice, knowing that our reward does not come in 'seeing' results all the time, but our rejoicing comes because our names are written in heaven.

Doing what you can, can bring rejection.

Andrew Gamon tells a story about visiting a church member who was in hospital. The hospital room had 4 patients, and another family member was also visiting the person I had come to see. After a short time, I asked if I could pray for her. In guess, at this point, the visitor realised that I was a minister and that sparked something – for she immediately started shouting the foulest obscenities. She ran away from us down the hospital corridor, still shouting and swearing as she went!

We are God's disciples on earth in today's time. We are called to share how our faith has helped us. – called to share the love of God and encourage one another along life's way. We are also called to handle rejection! By doing so our faith grows and we are encouraged to keep on sharing.

So, what are some of the ways we can share the message of God's love in our community or to our friends and neighbours? It can be in an indirect way in something as simple as recycling – working to live a sustainable life by composting, and ditching plastic. Will we see the reward in our lifetime? Probably not, but by doing these things we are, in a loving way for future generations, and leaving the environment a better place to be, we are in a way spreading God's love and can rejoice knowing that we are doing what we can.

Jesus said to them 'The harvest is plentiful but the labourers are few, therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into the harvest. Go on your way. See, I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves.

Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals, and don't stop to greet anyone on the road. Whatever house you enter, first say 'Peace to this house!' and if anyone is there who shares this peace, your peace will rest on that person. But if not, that peace will return to you. Remain in the same house, eating and drinking whatever they provide, for the labourer deserves to be paid. Do not move about from house to house. Whenever you enter a town and it's people welcome you, eat what is set before you. Cure the sick who are there. The kingdom of God has come near to you. But whenever you enter a town and they don't welcome you, go out into the streets and say 'Even the dust of your town that clings to our feet, we wipe off in protest against you. Yet know this: the kingdom of God has come near.' I assure you that on judgement day God will show more mercy to Sodom than to that town'. After going out into the towns as Jesus commanded them, the seventy returned with joy, saying, 'Lord, in your name even the demons submit to us!' Jesus said to them 'I watched Satan fall from heaven like a flash of lightening. See, I have given you authority to tread on snakes and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy; and nothing will hurt you. Nevertheless, do not rejoice at this, that the spirits submit to you, but rejoice that your names are written in heaven.'

So, let's listen to what the Spirit would say to us today.

Some may visit shut ins, volunteer for Hospice, offer to babysit the neighbours kids so the new mother can get a few hours sleep – offer a wave or a smile as we pass someone along the path – call that person we had a disagreement with and extend an olive branch to start anew or simply lend an ear to the person sitting next to us on a Sunday morning who may have had a rough week.

The hardest part is the first step. Just like the disciples had to go to that first house and knock on the door, we need to allow ourselves to be open to share, to listen, to lend a hand, or to open our mouth and shout from the street if necessary. We do this because it is God in us who is calling us to share God's message of hope and salvation – the message of faith and trust in Jesus. We act out of love for others because God did the same for us.

So, who were Jesus disciples – the 72 he 'sent out?' They were a mixture of people – farmers, fishermen, carpenters. I wonder if there were any women among them who could have been dressmakers, cooks, cleaners. I wonder! Who are Jesus' disciples today? I guess farmers, businessmen and women, builders, homemakers, cooks, in fact, you and me.

By being the light of love to those around us – being God's hands and feet - not only will our community change, but we will be changed also. And that is something we can all rejoice in. Amen
