## Reading

Luke 5: 1-11

### Reflection

Our text this morning is the story of how Christ called Peter to be his disciple. In the beginning of the story, he is fishing for fish; by the end of the story, he is fishing for people.

It is interesting to consider the people Jesus chose as his first disciples. It's clear that he didn't go to an executive search firm or visit the recruitment office at the local college.

He started by calling men with dirt under their fingernails, blue-collar types, men with little education, men who knew about hard work and the value of perseverance. Fishermen. Jesus chose fishermen as his first followers. Not so likely? Not how we would do it! I wonder why Jesus started with fishermen. Perhaps fishermen understood this story very well. To be a fisherman you need patience above everything else.

Sometimes wives ask their husbands 'how can you stand there by the rocks or in the boat or in the water for hours on end, waiting for a fish to bite?' The answer is 'It's easy.' That's what fishing is all about. And if you can't handle getting no fish occasionally, then you probably would better off not fishing at all.

The progress of this story is very simple. First Peter caught fish, then Jesus caught Peter, then Peter caught people. It all begins with a frustrated fisherman cleaning his nets after a long hard night.

Nothing in this story happens by chance. All is meant to teach us an important truth: God still prepares us for his call by allowing us to endure personal failure. Until we sense our need of him, we will not be ready to follow him. After all, if you think you are self-sufficient, why would you need Christ? Peter must be broken before he is ready to respond to Christ's call.

When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, 'put out into deep water, and let down your nets for a catch.' Simon Peter answered 'Master, we've worked hard all night and haven't caught anything. But because you say so, I will let down the nets.'

The words of Jesus contain both a command and a promise. It's not as if Jesus is saying 'Let's go out into the deep water, put down your nets, and we'll see what happens.' Jesus is promising that if Peter will obey, he will catch fish. I'm sure that after a long night of fruitless fishing, this must have been hard to believe.

We can learn some useful lessons from this: 1) God never gives foolish commands – though they may look foolish at the time: 2) God intends to bless those who obey him without hesitation: 3) God's greatest miracles usually require our co-operation.

There were certainly reasons for Peter to be sceptical. After all, the experience of the previous night seemed conclusive. As a professional fisherman, Peter knew the lake. And he knew that sometimes even the best fishermen sometimes caught nothing. He could have said 'Sorry, Lord, but it's not worth the trouble.' Or 'I'm the expert here.' Now comes the time to 'fish or cut bait.' What will Peter do?

He decided to go fishing in the middle of the day. Why? All fishermen know the answer. He went because he was a fisherman and every fisherman lives by the creed: 'You never know what may happen next time.' True fishermen are always ready to give it another go.

Why not? When you have caught nothing, you can't wait to get back on the water again.

And there is always a reason you failed last time. 'Too much light, too little light, the water was too clear or too muddy, the fish were too deep or too shallow, there was too much wind or not enough wind. It doesn't matter, does it? Fishermen love to fish. And that's why Peter was ready to give it another go even after a night of frustration and no fish.

'When they had done so, they caught such a large number of fish that their nets began to break. So, they signalled their partners in the other boat to come and help them, and they came and filled both boats so full that they began to sink.'

This is what fisherman dream about. They spend a lifetime fishing in hopes that maybe one day something like this will happen – to them. What a sight! So many fish came into the nets that they began to break, and they filled up two boats with fish. Think about that. Two overloaded boats flopping everywhere slowly coming ashore. This is the biggest catch ever – and it happened in the middle of the day.

There is a nice little moral to this story – 'Empty nets without him, full nets with him.' Let's go fishing with Jesus every day!

When Simon Peter saw this, he fell at Jesus' feet and said 'go away from me, Lord: I am a sinful man!' for he and all his companions were astonished at the catch of fish they had taken, and so were James and John, the sons of Zebedee, Simon's partners.

This is the kind of confession we don't often hear today. One might expect Peter to be bragging to his friends, 'Hey, look at all these fish! We're the greatest fishermen in the world.' But instead, Peter is overwhelmed by the enormous catch of fish. I think Jesus has completely blown his categories. To Peter, a good catch might be 30 fish or perhaps 50 to 100 fish, but he never dreamed of catching 5000 fish at one time. Instead of elating him, the sight of such a large catch zapped his confidence and left him dazed and frightened. Here is a man who has been deeply changed on the inside. His pride has been burned away by a transforming vision of Christ.

Then Jesus said to Simon Peter, 'Don't be afraid; from now on you will catch men.' So they pulled their boats up on shore, left everything and followed him. I find it interesting that Jesus seems in a sense to ignore Peter's desperate confession of unworthiness. Jesus knows the truth about Peter and he knew it all along. What matters is that Peter now knows the truth about himself. With his pride stripped away, he is now ready to serve the Lord.

There is a lesson for us to ponder in all of this. When we encounter Jesus, we will never be the same again. No one can meet Jesus and walk away unchanged. We may end up closer to God or we may harden our hearts, but no one ever meets Jesus and stays the way they were before. In Peter's case, his confession became part of his testimony. He knew he was a sinner and wasn't ashamed to admit it. God can use someone who knows their weaknesses and doesn't try to hide them.

The same thing happens to all of us sooner or later. When we respond to Christ's call, he changes us and then he changes our personal agenda. If we decide to take Christ seriously, we may end up doing something we never thought possible. 'What if Jesus asks me to do something I can't do?' He will! He always does! If he only asked you to do stuff you could already do, you wouldn't need him. But when he asks us to do something we can't do, he gives us the power to do it even so. Jesus invites us to be his followers, to be his eyes, his hands, his feet in helping him lead others to a full life.

I wonder if you are aware that Jesus has offered that same invitation to you? How do you become a fisher of people? – by following Jesus; just that – that's enough. So, we've seen that true disciples love to hear God's word taught, they obey Jesus even when it doesn't make sense, they are aware of their own sinfulness, and they become fishers of people who will take seemingly audacious risks for God.

The call is the same to us as it was in Luke's time. Would those first followers of Jesus respond to his call? How would they respond? And – what about you? What about us as a community?

Jesus says to us today 'Put out into deep waters, and prepare for the catch.'
