Message: The risen, crucified God

Introduction

The usual way of talking about Christ in the Easter message is to call him "the crucified and risen One", but in the context of our world today we need to reverse this phrase to "the risen crucified One".

Last few years at this time the whole world was experiencing the shadow of the Cross due the corona pandemic, which has not left us yet, but we manage to live with it. Furthermore, due to the unwanted proxy wars in the world, especially in Ukraine and Palestine, in Palestine it's genocide, killing innocent cavillations, women's and children. Starvation, hunger, fear, uncertainty and insecurity prevail more than at any other time in the history of humanity. Today around the world most of the Churches were celebrating on Easter Sunday while some people around the world even in our country NZ were living under the shadow of the Cross.

It is ironic to mention that the poor were crucified with poverty and their children were dying in unwanted proxy wars and in hunger, and even today, millions are confined to refugee camps as we continue the 2000-year tradition of celebrating Easter while God is in the mission of getting the poor and vulnerable down from the Cross. Do we feel any kind of solidarity? Millions are living with fear and have boneyard lives, or are experiencing the shadow of the cross.

With that same fear, there is a large number of children among these most vulnerable populations. Today, there are nearly 40 million children who have been uprooted from their homes, including over 20 million internally displaced within their home countries, 12.7 million refugees and 1.1 million asylum seekers. All of them are living under the shadow of the Cross.

Each day, wars, disasters, climate change and extreme poverty drive people from their homes to the Cross. The war and violence have taken away what they had called "theirs." Their husbands and fathers were killed and today they are left with "nothing." Is this not the Cross that we are talking about? Are they not humans created in the image of God? We talk about new Life, Hope, and the Resurrection, what does it mean to those people? Those millions of people are groaning to be liberated. And, we know that the whole of creation has been groaning as in the pains of childbirth for liberation, right up to the present time, Romans 8:22.

In that sense 'the Cross' which is central to the Christian faith is not a past incident but an ever-present reality. Therefore, the image of the crucified God is here right in our midst. In today's context the crucified God is re-incarnated amidst and within the poor, the war victims and in the midst of over a million people who are still fighting against poverty. The Liberation that Jesus brought to us through suffering and death was not a play act or a drama. On Thursday our Lord went through horrific agony till his blood vessels opened, it was a lonely battle in the darkness. Jesus threw himself face downward on the ground, and prayed, "My Father, if it is possible, take this cup of suffering from me! Yet not what I want, but what you want." Matt. 26:39.

On Friday he was handed over from one to another, he became non-human, a thing. Then the powerful at the time, with the aid of colonial power, dragged Him to the cross where he experienced the cruellest horrific death of the time. He became a victim and even felt his Abba Father deserted him, but despite being a victim he created space for the offender, victimiser, executor, "Father forgives them." The executor praised God, saying certainly he is a good man Lk 23:47, other people went back home beating their chest in sorrow Lk 23: 48. My point here is that the Liberation he brought to human beings cost him His sweat, blood and His life.

1. The cross was the battle field of good and evil, truth and untruth. So, Jesus was crucified. That horrific form of public execution was the normal way that the Roman Empire dealt with sedition or resistance of any kind.

More than a thousand insurgents were crucified in and around
Jerusalem about the time of Jesus' birth. Tens of thousands were

crucified when Rome destroyed the Temple and took back the city of Jerusalem from the rebels in 70 AD.

It is no coincidence that this is around the same time the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke were being composed around stories of Jesus' passion and death. Among the first readers of the Gospels, almost everyone would have known someone who had been crucified just like Jesus – a neighbour, an uncle, a father, a husband, or a son. They knew for themselves what it meant to be "the least" or "dispensable or disposable thing" in the Empire of Rome. They knew it in their own broken hearts, their own wounded spirits, their own damaged minds and imaginations.

The incarnated God, the Ultimate truth was dragged to the cross like a disposable thing and nailed; According to the human mind, it was a victory to evil and untruth. They thought they have nailed, killed and buried the Ultimate Truth, who would never come back to life. His two disciples felt sad and disappointed. Lk 24:20-21...And we had hoped that he would be the one who was going to set Israel free! Besides all that, this is now the third day since it happened It was a victory to evil or darkness and the untruth, because with the death of Jesus Christ the whole community, were defeated and like living dead and had no life. Christ also died on the cross with these words on his lips; "my God my God why have you forsaken me?" His death not only seemed to have buried all hopes for liberation but also destroyed the disciple's faith. We see the devastation in the youth on the road to Emmaus LK 24:21, Had death been stronger than so great a Love? Can death bury the ultimate truth or the incarnated God? 2. The ultimate eternal truth cannot be buried for too long,

A few days after Jesus' death an unheard-of event, unique in the human history occurred...God raised him up from death! Acts 2: 24, The ultimate eternal Truth cannot be buried for too long, it came back to life again. This was great news for the whole community of Christ who thought they were defeated, dead, faith and hope all gone with the power of death. But with the power of resurrection the whole community came back to life, to breathe life into the dead and crucified. The

resurrection of Christ gave meaning and life to the crucified, dead, defeated humanity, it is the reality of any time and in any context. This is the real meaning of the resurrection for us and to the people, who have been crucified, by the power of the poverty, hunger, malnutrition, war, fear, uncertainty etc.

So that's what I've been reflecting for Good Friday and Easter and that's how the gospel of the risen crucified one still pits the Kingdom of God against the contemporary Empire which counts some people as disposable, - those who are old, or who have medical complications, refugees, asylum seekers and their children, the homeless, child

soldiers, people living in poverty ... This all looks different after "the explosion of the resurrection" of the crucified one. Amen.
