<u>Message:</u> The Rich Young Man is Asked to Become Poor Before Becoming His Disciple.

Text: Mark 10:17 a man came running

Matthew 19: 22, rich young man

Only Matthew says that he was young.....

Only Luke says he was a ruler.....Lk 18: 18.....

Gospel According to the Hebrews: (which was one of the very early gospels which failed to be included in the NT).

The second of the rich men said to him,' Master, what good thing can I do and live?' He said unto him, 'O man, fulfill the law and the prophets.' He answered him, 'I have kept them.' He said unto him, 'Go and sell all that thou ownest, and distribute it unto the poor, and, come, follow me.' But the rich man began to scratch his head, and it pleased him not. And the Lord said unto him, 'How sayest thou, I have kept the law and the prophets? For it is written in the law: Thou salt love thy neighbour as thyself; and lo. Many of thy brethren, sons of Abraham, are in filth, dying of hunger, and thine house is full of many good things, and nought at all goeth out of it unto them.' "

To understand this, is to know Him; to practice this, is to follow Him.

Poverty, is not merely a material rejection of wealth, because mammon is much more than money...Mammon is what I do with money and what it does to me.

This story, again, intends to be experienced rather than explained - experienced in a way that keeps us focused on the real-life demands of discipleship, on the seriousness of the new community, the kingdom of God, and the journeys that promise that God's salvation is possible.

Here is a deeply religious person so well-mannered in his practices. But he can sense that there is **more** out there than what he has experienced so far. He asks Jesus about the **"more,"** but his question focuses on what needs to be added or the next step, but he discovers instead that eternal life entails interaction with their neighbour and their whole self. The major thing that was asked was to become poor before becoming his follower or disciple.

How hard it will be for rich people to enter the kingdom of God, vs. 23, Lk 6: 20-24, It is too difficult for them unless God's miraculous intervention helps them. (Story of Zacchaeus, Luke 19: 1-10).

This event very clearly describes Christ's own attitudes and the pattern of behaviour.

To understand this, is to know him; to practice this, is to follow him.

Here is the key to the whole passage. The young man claimed to have kept the law, but for Jesus if he kept the commandments? the law? or teaching of the prophets? His neighbour would not die in hunger.

Poverty is the most lucrative business talk in our days. Poverty has become an enjoyable Mammon for the ...Church, INGO's NGO's ... Governments. But the poor are still in hunger & dying without basic needs being met. Poverty is an absolute fact in the world today.

<u>Quote</u>: Leonardo Boff: Speaks about different kinds of PovertyVoluntary Poverty & Forced Poverty.

<u>Voluntary Poverty</u> is 'Liberating': In our biblical passage Jesus was asking this young man to give up his wealth and follow him, that is the first step for his liberation or salvation.

Forced Poverty, is the fruit of structural social SIN, it has no right to exist, if we keep the commandments of God.

We recall the story of Lazarus.

Gandhi put it well when he said, 'There is enough for everyone's need but there is not enough for everyone's greed."

Wealth therefore, is an evil only when it is accumulated. Bread too is a SIN against the body of Christ, if consumed by a few, while others starve (see 1 Cor 11: 21 ff). But when it broken and shard, it becomes a holy sacrament.

If wealth, too, is distributed "according to need" so there will be no needy person, see Act 4: 34 – 35. It ceases to be Mammon it becomes a holy sacrament.
