Reading: Mark 10:46-52

Reflection: It Is OK to Ask for Help

Bartimaeus the blind beggar of Jericho, (Mk 10.46–52; synoptic parallels Mt 9.27–31, 20.29–34, Lk 18.35–43). Luke's version does not name the blind man, and Matthew makes him two anonymous men).

In the Gospel of MK he was introduced as "Bartimaeus, Bar/Timaeus = son of Timaeus". This is often read as if Bartimaeus is his name, and his father is Timaeus. However, the simple fact that 'bar' is the Aramaic meaning for son. or 'son of Timaeus' is the partial translation of 'Bartimaeus' (*Ṭimai bar Ṭimai*

Three gospels use the title "Son of David" to refer to Jesus, which has messianic connotations. I believe that reading 'Son of Timai' as a counterpart to 'Son of David' might help us find meaning in the name.

The essential question is what does 'Timaeus' or 'Timai' mean?

• The root of the Aramaic word (timē), which is itself borrowed from the Greek (timē), meaning 'honour', 'worth' or 'price'. It might then be able to translate 'Bartimaeus' as 'the honoured one', 'the worthy one' or even 'the ransomed one' (bought at a price). This understanding of the term suggests a type of Israel: that the Son of Israel is a blind beggar crying out for the Son of David.

The audience of MK is about two types of Israel/people; I, Self-righteous and arrogant, 2. The roadside weak and needy waiting for justice, mercy and healing.

This understanding of the term suggests that **the Son of Israel is a blind beggar crying out for the Son of David.** "Jesus, Son of David or Bar-David, have mercy on me!" Bartimaeus was desperate to be healed, so he called out for what he needed although he was rebuked for doing so. Bartimaues' neighbours probably found **his display of desperation embarrassing**.

Not choosing silence over the possibilities, Many times in our communities we allow ourselves and others to suffer in silence, or we are forced to be silent in many different ways, because of our cultural upbringings, religious taboos, (visa conditions), poverty, dependency, lack of awareness of the possibilities, this list can on and on.. but we respond to them in many different ways. In this passage, Jesus shows us that he is **not ashamed** by our cries.

Usually when we are down with, **loneliness**, **disease**, **disability**, **financial hardship**, **broken relationships**, **or grief**, instead of calling out for help, we hold everything within, **choosing silence over other possibilities**.

Jesus responds to his cries by asking him what he wants. This short passage can teach us a great deal about **how to handle suffering in our own lives** and the lives of those in our community.

God never meant for us to suffer alone and Jesus' response to Bartimaeus shows this. <u>Instead of silencing those who are crying out for Re-assurance of comfort, love, healing or justice</u>, we are here to encourage them to respond to the call of Jesus. Jesus asked him, "What do you want me to do for you?"

Prayer - God our healer, the one who hears our loud and silent cries, please help us to boldly come to your throne of grace in our time of need. Help us to be a community that allows those in pain to be transparent, help us to encourage our brothers and sisters know that even in their pain you are calling them to come and commune with you. In Jesus name, Amen.
